2 Peter 2:10-17

2 Peter - Previously

- We are continuing our examination of false teachers in 2 Peter 2.
 In our last lesson, we began noting the corrupt character of these false teachers:
 - They walk in lusts and uncleanness
 - They despise authority & speak evil of what they do not understand
 - They are presumptuous and self-willed
- Today, we continue to examine their character.

- They walk according to the flesh in the lust of uncleanness
- Noted in our last lesson, we find many of these living corrupt and immoral lives.
 NOTE: If one does not respect God's boundaries of His word, why would it surprise us if they do not respect His boundaries concerning godly living.
- Sadly, we have heard of spiritual leaders caught up in immoral practices and the damage it does to the cause of Christ.

- They carouse even in the daytime (13)
- Descriptive of a life that is out of control.
- Typically, immoral behaviors are associated with darkness cf. 1 Thessalonians 5:4-7,
 Romans 13:11-13, etc.
- Here, one openly and unashamedly engages in sinful conduct. He doesn't care what others think (cf. 1 Corinthians 5:1-2)

- Spots and blemishes, carousing in their own deceptions (13)
- They are lying to themselves AND to others and exploiting them.
 - These take advantage of the gullible -
 - cf. 2 Timothy 3:6, 2 Peter 2:18

- Eyes full of adultery and that cannot cease from sin, enticing unstable souls (14)
- Lit. "Eyes full of an adulteress". Descriptive
 of one looking to engage in immoral practices.
 Cf. Proverbs 7:4ff
- "enticing unstable souls", same as exploiting the gullible. Found here, vs. 18 & James
 1:14 the "baiting" of Satan

- Eyes full of adultery and that cannot cease from sin, enticing unstable souls (14)
- They are so caught up in their sin they cannot (do not want to) stop.
- The Bible continually warns against lusts 1 John 2:15-17, James 1:12-15 the process of temptation leading to spiritual death.
- Matthew 5:27-30, Jesus warned against sensual lusts beginning in the heart! A big concern today!

- Hearts trained in covetous practices (14)
- Another "lust" the desire for more, especially that which they are not entitled to.
 1 Timothy 6:6-10, Colossians 3:1-7 describes covetousness as idolatry.
- Jesus also warned against this in His Sermon on the Mount Matthew 6:19-21.
 Luke 12:15, Take heed and beware of covetousness...

- Hearts trained in covetous practices (14)
- Often covetousness is behind the motives of false teachers. He is willing to compromise truth for material gain.
- He will exploit others for more personal gain.
- E.g., the "health and wealth" preachers with extravagant lifestyles.

- They are accursed (14)
- Meaning, to God they stand condemned. And they ought to stand condemned by us also (elders, preachers, teachers, faithful saints).
- Recall **vs. 11**, "like natural brute beasts caught to be destroyed... they will utterly perish in their own corruption."

- Gone astray like Balaam (15-16)
- WE read of Balaam in **Numbers 22-25** and find his greed.
- Hired by King Balak of Moab, while he is unable to curse Israel as a prophet, he finds a "work around" (ch. 25). 24,000 Israelites die!
- Numbers 31:16, Revelation 2:14, it was through his counsel that Israel sinned.

- Gone astray like Balaam (15-16)
- Vs. 16 mentions Balaam's conversation with his donkey, Numbers 22:22-30.
- Why is this mentioned? Consider the blindness of Balaam. This describes the lengths to which one blinded FROM the truth will go (cf. 2 Peter 2:10)

Further descriptions - 2:17

They are wells without water (17)
 Also described as clouds (mists) carried about by a tempest.

Jude 12-13 adds, These are spots in your love feasts, while they feast with you without fear, serving only themselves. They are clouds without water, carried about by the winds; late autumn trees without fruit, twice dead, pulled up by the roots; raging waves of the sea, foaming up their own shame; wandering stars for whom is reserved the blackness of darkness forever.

Further descriptions - 2:17-18

• They are wells without water (17)

These are all descriptions of useless things. They offer promise but deliver nothing.

They speak "great swelling words of emptiness" (18) - when they speak, they may sound good, but when wisely measured, they are empty. Proverbs 18:17, The first one to plead his cause seems right, Until his neighbor comes and examines him. (cf. Ephesians 5:11)

How do we protect ourselves from such false teachers? The ONLY way is to be grounded in the faith 2 Timothy 2:15, Ephesians 4:11-16, etc.

Can you spot the false teacher?
Are you grounded in God's word?
